However, the sector faces challenges such as inadequate infrastructure, poor funding, lack of awareness, and security concerns^[1, 2]. With over 250 ethnic groups, Nigeria's rich cultural diversity offers rich opportunities for cultural immersion and appreciation as part of eco-tourism experiences. Eco-tourism supports the well-being of local communities and helps protect Nigeria's unique natural and cultural heritage, aligning with broader goals for sustainable development^[5].

Eco-tourism helps people to appreciate the beauty of nature and inspires new ways of preserving the environment. Eco-tourism can also aid in nature education research which has been identified as one of the ways of enhancing climate resilience in Nigeria^[6]. The impacts of climate change are being felt on Nigeria's economic growth in a profound way^[7]. Ecotourism can work hand in hand with eco-musicology and eco-theology towards enhancing climate resilience in Nigeria^[8, 9]. Identified eco-tourism sites in states like Cross River, Enugu, and Akwa Ibom of-

fer significant potential for development. By prioritizing eco-friendly practices and community involvement, Nigeria can harness its unique natural and cultural assets to foster sustainable development, protect its natural heritage, and create meaningful economic opportunities for its people. Eco-tourism and Eco-Volunteerism therefore play a great role in enhancing climate resilience in Nigeria.

3.2. Empirical Research Works on Eco-Tourism




Figure 1. Annual amount of all documents and the top three document types related to ecotourism during the last 27 years.




Figure 2. Differentials of generated revenue from tourism and ancillary tourism based outfits (2007–2016).

In a study conducted in 2016, researchers identified that ecotourism research has been progressive through their systematic review of a total of 2531 publication records during the last 27 years^[11, 16]. **Figure 1** highlights articles, proceedings papers and book reviews as three major document types which enhanced ecotourism research within the last 27 years since 2020. **Figure 2** further revealed that the tourism sector in Nigeria needs to be upgraded to enhance the green economy^[17]. **Table 1** revealed that private companies generated more for the government through tourism across Enugu State in Nigeria with 41% of the overall revenue. This was closely followed by the banking industry with 24% of the total revenue within the period under investigation^[17].

Eco-tourism enhances Nigeria's sustainable economic growth by generating revenue, creating jobs, fostering local businesses, and diversifying the economy away from oil dependence. It also promotes the conservation of natural and cultural heritage by providing an economic incentive for protecting ecosystems and supporting community-based conservation efforts. Key sectors that benefit include hospitality, transportation, and local handicrafts, while tourism revenues can be reinvested into conservation projects and the development of eco-friendly infrastructure.

- a) **Job Creation:** Ecotourism creates employment opportunities in various sectors, including hospitality, tour operations, transportation, and the handicraft industry.
- b) **Revenue Generation:** Visitors generate revenue for local businesses and governments, which can be used

to support conservation and development initiatives.

- c) **Economic Diversification:** By promoting wildlife tourism and other nature-based attractions, Nigeria can diversify its economy and reduce its reliance on traditional sectors like oil.
- d) **Support for Local Businesses and Crafts:** Eco-tourism creates markets for local products and services, such as agriculture, handicrafts, and local cuisine, directly benefiting local communities.
- e) **Infrastructure Development:** The growth of eco-tourism necessitates the development of sustainable infrastructure, including eco-friendly accommodations and transport, which can further stimulate the local economy.
- f) **Cultural Preservation:** By valuing local traditions and cultures, ecotourism encourages their preservation and promotes authentic, immersive experiences for visitors.
- g) **Conservation:** Ecotourism provides a financial incentive for conserving Nigeria's rich biodiversity and natural heritage, such as its diverse ecosystems and wildlife.
- h) **Poverty Alleviation:** It offers new income-generating opportunities for rural and local communities, helping to alleviate poverty and improve livelihoods.
- i) **Cultural Preservation:** By valuing local traditions and cultures, ecotourism encourages their preservation and promotes authentic, immersive experiences for visitors.
- j) **Community Involvement:** Ecotourism emphasizes the involvement of local communities, ensuring they benefit from and participate in the conservation of their natural and cultural resources.

5. Enhancing Eco-Tourism Through Eco-Volunteerism in Nigeria

Eco-volunteerism directly enhances eco-tourism in Nigeria by actively contributing to conservation efforts like wildlife protection and waste management, and by providing trained local guides and cultural hosts, which improves visitor experiences and creates economic opportunities for local communities, fostering sustainable development and community engagement. This bottom-up approach empow-

ers communities to manage their natural resources, generate income, and build local capacity, thereby strengthening the overall sustainability and success of Nigeria's ecotourism sector^[12]. Eco-Volunteerism achieves the goal of enhancing eco-tourism in Nigeria through the following strategies:

- a) **Environmental Stewardship:** Eco-volunteers participate in local projects to protect wildlife, clean natural areas, and develop eco-friendly infrastructure, directly improving the sites for eco-tourism.
- b) **Waste Management:** Eco-volunteers can help implement and improve waste management systems at eco-tourism sites, reducing environmental impact and enhancing the aesthetic appeal of the locations.
- c) **Habitat Preservation:** By directly engaging in conservation activities, eco-volunteers help maintain and restore natural habitats, ensuring the long-term viability of wildlife and natural attractions crucial for eco-tourism.
- d) **Training and Skills Development:** Eco-volunteers, often young people, can learn and share skills to become wildlife guides, cultural hosts, and eco-entrepreneurs, leading to a more skilled local workforce for the eco-tourism sector.
- e) **Community Involvement:** By working alongside local communities, volunteers help build local capacity for managing and benefiting from eco-tourism, moving from a top-down approach to a more community-driven model.
- f) **Awareness and Education:** Eco-volunteer initiatives can raise awareness among local communities and visitors about the importance of conservation and responsible tourism practices, fostering a stronger commitment to sustainability.
- g) **Revenue Generation:** By supporting local projects and providing services like guided tours or homestays, eco-volunteers contribute to economic opportunities, generating income for communities.
- h) **Local Product Development:** Eco-volunteers can help develop and market eco-friendly local products, creating new income streams and supporting local economies.
- i) **Sustainable Livelihoods:** Through skills development and active involvement in eco-tourism management, eco-volunteers help create sustainable livelihoods within local communities, fostering economic

growth that aligns with environmental protection.

5.1. Maximizing the Benefits of Eco-Tourism in Nigeria

Ecotourism in Nigeria offers numerous benefits, including environmental protection, local economic development, and increased awareness of biodiversity. It promotes sustainable tourism practices, reduces the negative impacts of tourism on the environment, and enhances the well-being of local communities^[20]. There is therefore a great need for the institutions, communities and the government to realize and maximize the benefits of ecotourism for sustainable development in Nigeria.

These benefits are discussed in detail below.

Benefits of Ecotourism in Nigeria:

- a) **Environmental Protection:** Ecotourism encourages the preservation of natural habitats and wildlife, contributing to biodiversity conservation.
- b) **Local Economic Development:** It creates employment opportunities in tourism-related businesses and supporting industries like hospitality and transportation.
- c) **Increased Revenue for Government:** Ecotourism can generate revenue for the government, which can be used to improve infrastructure and support conservation efforts.
- d) **Community Empowerment:** Ecotourism provides opportunities for local communities to benefit from tourism, contributing to poverty alleviation and improved living standards.
- e) **Promotes Sustainable Development:** Ecotourism encourages responsible travel practices that minimize environmental impact and support local cultures.
- f) **Enhanced Cultural Understanding:** Ecotourism can help travellers learn about and appreciate Nigeria's diverse cultural heritage.
- g) **Increased Awareness of Biodiversity:** Ecotourism promotes education about the natural world and the importance of conservation.

5.2. Psychological Impacts of Eco-Volunteerism and Eco-Tourism in Nigeria

In Nigeria, eco-volunteerism and ecotourism can lead to positive psychological impacts by increasing environmen-

tal awareness, fostering a sense of identity and responsibility for nature, and enhancing community pride and well-being. - a) Increased Environmental Awareness:** Participating in ecotourism activities can enhance tourists' understanding of environmental issues and the importance of conservation, fostering positive attitudes towards nature.
- b) Enhanced Satisfaction:** Satisfying experiences in eco-tourism accommodations and nature tours can lead to increased tourist satisfaction and a willingness to recommend these sites to others.
- c) Reinforced Positive Behaviors:** Awareness of and involvement in environmental management practices during ecotourism can reinforce positive attitudes, leading to interest in further ecotourism experiences and environmental actions.
- d) Elevated Sense of Identity and Responsibility:** Eco-tourism can deepen residents' sense of connection and responsibility to their natural and cultural heritage, promoting active participation in conservation efforts.
- e) Community Empowerment and Pride:** By engaging with tourists and experiencing their culture being valued, local communities can feel a greater sense of pride and empowerment, according to this document.
- f) Potential for Negative Impacts:** Disempowerment can occur if local communities are not adequately involved in the planning and decision-making processes of ecotourism projects, which can lead to hostility and decreased participation.
- g) Promotes Sustainable Relationships:** Ecotourism fosters a holistic perspective where the well-being of people and the environment are interconnected, promoting long-term benefits for all stakeholders.
- h) Fosters Global Consciousness:** Engaging with different natural and cultural environments can cultivate a broader global awareness of the need for sustainable practices and interconnectedness between local and global communities.

6. Recommendations

- a)** Social media platforms such as Facebook, LinkedIn, Instagram, Tik Tok, etc. can be used as a tool for awareness creation and promotion of eco-volunteerism and eco-tourism for climate resilience and sustainable economic growth in Nigeria.
- b)** Government should provide incentives such as grants and awards to promising youths in Nigeria thereby enhancing their use of eco-volunteerism in advancing eco-tourism in Nigeria.
- c)** Artificial Intelligence can be smartly incorporated into higher education institutions' systems thereby advancing the role of eco-volunteerism in enhancing eco-tourism for climate resilience and sustainable economic growth in Nigeria.
- d)** Green financing from multilateral organizations such as the World Bank Group will also help the country to provide more infrastructure and systems towards maximizing the benefits of eco-volunteerism and eco-tourism for sustainable economic growth in Nigeria^[21].
- e)** Educational blogs can be used as a valuable tool to promote eco-volunteerism and eco-tourism for climate resilience and sustainable economic growth in Nigeria.
- f)** Policies and Laws should be enacted and enforced by the Nigerian government towards maximizing the benefits of eco-volunteerism and eco-tourism for climate resilience and sustainable economic growth in Nigeria.

7. Conclusions

Nigeria has the potential to be a major contributor to eco-tourism thereby enhancing its climate resilience and sustainable economic growth. Eco-volunteerism when engaged effectively and efficiently in eco-tourism can enhance green entrepreneurship and green leadership which have the capacity to enhance the quality of life for both the eco-volunteers and the eco-tourists^[22, 23]. Nigerian Government should therefore work actively with the United Nations towards promoting eco-volunteerism and eco-tourism for enhancing climate resilience and sustainable economic growth. The United Nations promotes ecotourism primarily through the World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to achieve sustainable development, poverty alleviation, and conserva-

tion^[24]. The United Nations supports eco-volunteerism primarily through the United Nations Volunteers (UNV) program, which partners with UN agencies like UN Environment (UNEP) to deploy volunteers for conservation and environmental protection efforts^[25, 26]. By effectively leveraging the power of eco-tourism and eco-volunteerism, Nigerian government in collaboration with the United Nations can create a more engaging and meaningful tourism experience that not only benefits visitors but also contributes to the conservation and sustainability of its natural heritage. However, there is a need for deeper research on this subject matter which can be carried out by scholars, researchers and professionals at the higher education institutions in Nigeria.
